




Landscape



Located in the heart of the hillside vineyards, just west of the village of Marsannay-La-Côte, le Clos de Jeu ranges in altitude from 974 to 1020 feet (297 to 311 metres), with an average of 974 feet (303 m). The slope is very gentle (2%) to moderate (8%), with an average of 4% . Exposure is south south-east.

Soil and subsoil



The subsoil of the Clos de Jeu is exclusively made up of Limestone, even if cut by several faults. The **Crinoidal Limestone**, with its warm ochre color, dominates. The **Prémieux Limestone** occupies two smaller areas. The soil, of medium thickness is clayey and rich in stones.

Background

The term «clos», from the Latin «clausus» (closed) is frequently used in the wine terminology. It refers to the limits of the plot, surrounded by a wall. The associated word «jeu» is curious, because it could evoke a wood, from the celtic type “juris”, meaning the woody hill. The use of the article «le» (the) in the place-name indicates that the name was adopted after 1000 AD.

Wines

Red Wine



The eye-catching ruby of this wine leads on to the great finesse of the aromas on the nose. The attack is soft and supple. The body, the generous viscosity and the beautiful liveliness combine in a silky texture that will acquire depth as the wine ages. The mouth-watering finish ends with lengthy aromatic persistence, and notes of red fruits, violet , and soft spices.

It will pair well with lamb or kid meat.

Serving temperature: 15–17 °C
